AN ENTREPRENEURIAL VISION

When given the chance to ask staff about Kevin Silkey, one word kept popping up in every conversation, that word was leadership. Kevin founded The Richardson School back in 2011 along with MyPath (then ORP) CEO Jim Balestrieri with the hope of creating a school that would provide the structure and attention that some students need. Terry Leahy, the current CEO of MyPath, remembers when it first began, "I have told this story many times, but the origin of TRS goes back to a meeting he and I had more than 10 years ago in the old HIL offices in West Allis where he was borrowing an office. He had a blank yellow legal pad, and the topic for discussion that day was, 'How To Start a School.' So we brainstormed on what we would need. 'Building.' 'Licensed School Administrator.' 'Teachers'. 'Staff.' 'School District Need Assessment.' And then he was off and running. And now here we are! I should also note that Kevin asked a very important question before he began his TRS journey: Will I still have a job at (then) ORP if the idea doesn't pan out? Jim Balestrieri and I said, absolutely. It is critical for the future growth of MyPath that our leaders know that they have the freedom to try out new ideas and services, and they will have a safety net and support if what we think is a great idea does not work out. That is critical to shape an entrepreneurial organization that is always learning."



Twelve years later, TRS has opened five schools, served over 130 districts and over 600 students. Holding a presence in all five of the schools, staff would often be able to meet and interact with Kevin both personally, when they would ask him advice, and professionally when he would be directly helping with the students. Many of the staff viewed Kevin as the face of TRS representing the value and drive of the organization.

Beginning in 2023 Kevin accepted a new role in the organization, becoming Mypath's Director of Emerging Services. In this role Kevin will focus on finding new locations for not only TRS, but all



of MyPath's companies. As sad as it is to see him go, we could not be more excited for Kevin in his new position. Kim Ray, Chief Operating Officer of MyPath, put it well when she said "Kevin's dedication to The Richardson School, its students and staff has been unwavering since he opened the first school in 2011. Hundreds of students later, five schools in total, and hundreds of lives touched, the TRS schools thrive due to Kevin's dedication, hard work, passion, and compassion. The foundation is solid, the future is bright, I wish Kevin well in his next endeavor. I'm excited all of MyPath will benefit from his entrepreneurial vision as he helps to shape our future."

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Kevin is succeeded by Derek Goodman as Executive Director of The Richardson School. Derek was the Executive Director at Paragon Community Services, another MyPath Company. We are very excited about what the future holds for MyPath.


